NOTES FROM FR. VANDEWALLE

**Feast of the Epiphany** – Formerly, the Feast of the Epiphany included three ‘epiphanies’ or ‘valuable reveals’: (1) The Visit of the Wise Men, whereby they represented the nations and Jesus was revealed a the light to ALL people; (2) The Baptism of the Jesus in the Jordan with the descent of the Holy Spirit up him with the ‘reveal’ by the voice of the Father from heaven, saying, “This is my beloved Son, listen to him.”; and (3) The first public miracle of Jesus of turning water into wine at the wedding at Cana. This showed forth his power, his disciples began to believe in him, and this began his public ministry. These Three special ‘showing-forth’, or epiphanies, about Jesus as the Son of God and a light for the nations are now spread out and celebrated over these three Sundays after Christmas, to give more time to consider each one, individually. And now just the Wise Men’s visit, is considered as the Feast of the Epiphany. Reflection: In gratitude for these wonderful reveals of God’s love for me, what gifts of ‘gold, frankincense, and myrrh’ can I bring to God?

**Happy New Year** – The phrase ‘God is ever ancient, ever new, attributed to St. Augustine, reflects the timelessness of God’s beauty and truth, emphasizing how ancient practices and beliefs continue to resonate in contemporary faith and culture. Reflection: How is God calling me this new year to discover His timeless goodness and discover it anew in the world today, and bring it to the world today?

**Christmas Thank You:** Thank you so much to everyone for all the Christmas gifts, cards, prayers, and kindnesses! It was so nice to receive so many kind words and wishes and prayers; I appreciated all of them and all of you! Thank you, too, to all who in any way to make our Churches beautiful for Christmas, through music, cleaning, decorating, serving, and the like! I missed celebrating Christmas with you, due to some blood clots, but am glad to be back and on the mend to celebrate the new year and the rest of the Christmas Season! Merry Christmas!

**Epiphany Blessing of the Threshold** – This Annual Eastern Church tradition blessing your doorway is powerful against evil. The head of one’s home leads this prayer, invoking the wise men by their initials, Caspar, Melchior, Balthazar. We had an exorcist assistant talk to us on a priest study day and tell us how very powerful this blessing is against evil. Chalk and blessings are at back of the church. Please save, return, or dispose of blessed chalk reverently, such as by burying. Blessed Chalk and the Epiphany blessing are in packets at church, but I will include the blessing here in the bulletin as well.

**Epiphany Blessing of the Threshold** – [This is prayed before marking your threshold with blessed chalk]. Sacred is this threshold of our home and holy is this door. This is the meeting place of friend, neighbor, and stranger. May it be a bridge for our comings and goings. Whenever we stand in its sacred circle, may our eyes be granted new vision, so that we can see in friend or stranger the God of ten thousand disguises. May this threshold be a sacred space where we come to celebrate the Sacrament of Hospitality. May the spirits of evil never cross this threshold, and may the Name of the All-Holy-One protect our home from harm. May God’s angels stand guard at the right and the left of this opening to grace our comings and goings. May we who live in this home guard the sacredness of this doorway. May our hearts be always alert to the danger of falseness and pretense as we greet those who come to our door. Let our affection be graced with honesty and reverence, and may the oil of truth burn in the lamp of our eyes. Help us to remember that our ancestors were strangers and exiles in Egypt, that Joseph and Mary came knocking at a door like this, weary and in search of kindness. May we receive all at this door as Godly guests. May the blessing of God, and peace and grace of the All-Holy-One, surround this threshold and rest upon all who shall pass across it. R: Amen. [Blessed Chalk is now used to write the blessing above the door: 20 †C † M † B † 26]
